What is a Betty Lamp and what does it symbolize?

The Betty Lamp was chosen for the logo of the American Home Economics Association as the result of a contest in 1920. The Betty Lamp continued as the logo of the American Association of Family and Consumer Sciences (AAFCS) after the name change in 1994. In colonial days, the Betty Lamp provided light for all household industries. Representing the light of the mind, the Betty Lamp is an appropriate logo for AAFCS and all the associated disciplines.

Early in the 20th century, the Betty Lamp was adopted as a "Symbol of learning". The beam of the Betty Lamp symbolizes the following:

- The need of exact knowledge
- The appreciation of beauty
- The spirit of joy
- The power of strength
- The blessing of fellowship
- The satisfaction of achievement
- The value of service
- The bond of cooperation

The Ohio Association of Family and Consumer Sciences shares the philosophy with the national association that this Betty Lamp truly symbolizes the essence of what our association values. As a true "symbol of learning", OAFCS uses the Lamp as a visual reminder of its belief

DISTINGUISHED SERVICE AWARD

The Distinguished Service Award recognizes superior achievements in family and consumer sciences, outstanding contributions to the profession and sustained association leadership.

Barbara Vance

Barbara Vance, CFCS, taught 6th-12th grade at schools in Ohio and New Mexico for a combined 30 years after receiving her education degree from Ohio Dominican University. She received her Master's of Science from The Ohio State University while teaching full time at Washington Middle School. Barbara also served as a consultant for high school curriculum for the New Mexico Department of Education during a field study with Dartmouth College. Barbara was also active in the National, State and Vocational Education Associations. Barbara's service to our profession does not end in the classroom. Barbara has also shared her skills and knowledge to her community while providing food demonstrations, teaching others to sew, and making quilts with a service group. Throughout her career and after retirement, Barbara has been affiliated with Fayette County Professional Home Economist, Delaware County Home Economics, Fayette County Heart Association, Fayette Memorial Hospital Auxiliary, Fayette Co. Retired Teachers, Delta Kappa Gamma, Ohio 4-H Foundation Board Fundraiser, My Very Own Blanket, and Rogue Volunteer Charity Sewers. Her service to these organizations has benefitted from her dedication, hard work, and leadership. OAFCS has been no exception to these benefits. Barbara has been a member for 50 years and has served on the board many of those years in a variety of officer positions and committee chairs. Barbara has also been a delegate and committee chair to the national organization AAFCS (AHEA at the time).

LEADER AWARD

The Leader Award identifies and honors family and consumer sciences professionals who have made significant contributions to the field through their involvement with OAFCS and AAFCS.

Susan Shockey

Susan Shockey, Ph.D., CFCS, CPFFE served as the USDA – National Institute of Food and Agriculture (NIFA) National Program Leader, Family and Consumer Economics. She currently provides leadership to the Ohio Association of Family & Consumer Sciences as the Annual Conference Vice President. Her research focuses on financial capability - attitude, behavior, and knowledge change through education and is published in the Journal of Financial Counseling and Planning, June 2004. The American Association of Family and Consumer Sciences (AAFCS) have recognized her research. Susan served as the AAFCS national President in 2011-12. As an OSU Professor Emeritus with The Ohio State University and a Cooperative Extension professional, Shockey held numerous leadership positions. Her focus as an Extension Educator and High School Home Economics teacher has been teaching personal financial independence. The Ohio Attorney General and State Treasurer appointed her to the Ohio Personal Finance Commission. In 2012, she received the Award of Distinction presented by The Ohio State University, College of Education and Human Ecology Alumni Society. She is affiliated with the American Association of Family and Consumer Sciences, Phi Upsilon Omicron, Kappa Omicron Nu Honor Society, Kappa Alpha Theta, and Indianola Presbyterian Church, near OSU Campus.

He also co-directed the Ohio Alliance, a statewide program of the national Sullivan Alliance to Transform the Health Professions.
